




Results of Parent Questionnaire March 2023


1. My child feels safe at this school.

75 responses




2. My child is making good progress at this school.


3. This school meets my child's particular needs.


4. This school ensures that my child is well looked after.


5. My child is taught well at this school.


6. This school helps my child to develop skills in communication, reading, writing and mathematics.


7. There is a good standard of behaviour at this school.


8. My child's lessons are not disrupted by bad behaviour.

9. This school deals with any cases of bullying effectively. (Bullying includes persistent name-calling, cyber, racist and homophobic bullying).



When we delved deeper into this question, we found that a significant percentage of parents responded with neutral because their child had not been subjected to any bullying.


10. This school helps me to support my child's learning.


11. This school responds well to my concerns.


12. This school keeps me well informed.

Actions Arising from Responses

- The school will endeavour to communicate effectively to parents through Parents' Evenings, newsletters, Parentmail, Facebook, e-mail, the school website and other avenues available. The school has now updated the website to include a virtual office where parents can access forms and letters. Parents new to the school will receive a booklet containing the key information and forms that they will need for their child starting at the school in September. Parents have teachers' work e-mail addresses so that they can contact them if they are unable to speak to them at the start or end of the school day. They can also contact members of the SLT through their work e-mails. SLT will continue to respond to parent contact outside of school hours (including weekends and holidays), where necessary.
- The school hosts SATs meetings, reading meetings and phonics meetings to enable parents to find out what they can do to support their child's learning. Homework is set around work done in class so that parents can see what their child has been learning that week. A termly curriculum coverage is uploaded to class pages of the school website so parents can see which units of work their children are undertaking in that term. Teachers set targets at parents' evenings so parents know what their child needs to work on to make even further progress. The school plans to host more in-person events and workshops to help parents support their children with their learning.
- The school pastoral lead is now well established and works with individual and groups of children across school to support emotional needs.
